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The Purpose of Freedom

As I write this, Independence Day is just around the corner. Our nation will, once again, celebrate the freedom we enjoy as Americans. We all learned the story in school of how we obtained our freedom. Patriots in the 13 original American colonies rebelled against their British rulers, declared their independence on July 4, 1776, fought a long hard war, gained their independence and established a new nation – the United States of America.

But have you ever considered why the colonists obtained their freedom and for what purpose? Somehow, I just can't believe that our forefathers risked everything they had, spilled their blood, and gave up their lives just so we could have 4th of July furniture and clothing sales, get a day off work, disturb our neighbors with the loud sound of fireworks, and party until we are drunk.

Freedom has been trivialized. Freedom is not just the right to do whatever you want. It means so much more than that. I believe our forefathers fought so hard for freedom so that we might be able to live together and cooperate to make a great nation free from outside aggression.

Our life with God is much the same. We'd like to think, especially as Americans, that we are pretty free and independent in our spiritual lives. But this is not true. Like people in colonial America who were not politically free, we are not spiritually free. We are bound and oppressed. In fact, we are slaves. Who is our master? Jesus says, "Everyone who sins is a slave of sin." We are, by nature, sinful and that sinful nature shows forth in sinful actions: either doing the evil things which God forbids or failing to do the good things God commands. We cannot break free of sin and stop doing it. Sin controls us and holds our destiny – death and hell. We yearn to be free of the sin that condemns us and the consequences of sin that plague us.

Jesus has freed us from our sin by His death on the cross. His death paid the price for our offenses against the Law of God. We are freed from the punishment that sin earns for us. We are free from the control sin has over us. By His resurrection from the dead, Jesus has earned a life of perfect freedom that begins now, extends through physical death, and lasts an eternity.

That is the *what* of the freedom which Christ has won for us. What about the *why* of that freedom? For what purpose has Christ given us freedom? Many people believe that we, as Christians, are now free to do whatever we want to do, either because the Law of God no longer applies to us or because Jesus will love us and forgive us, no matter what we do.

Paul describes the freedom Christians have in the book of Galatians. He writes, "For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery." (Galatians 5:1) In other words, we are not freed from the condemnation of sin and the control of sin simply so we can return to the slavery of sin. That makes no sense.

Paul goes on to say, "For you were called to freedom, brothers. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another." (Galatians 5:13) Freedom is not "an opportunity for the flesh" (a reason to sin), but as a chance for loving and serving other people. Since we are no longer burdened with having to obey the Law so that we are good enough before God and we no longer fear the punishment that sin brings, we are free to love and serve God by loving and serving other people because we want to.

When our country celebrates Independence Day, remember the freedom that many died to obtain for you. Value that freedom and don't take it for granted. Don't use that freedom selfishly but in service to fellow citizens. In the same way, when our church celebrates our freedom in and through Christ, remember that He died to obtain it for you. Don't use that freedom as an excuse to sin or selfishly serve yourself. Use your freedom in Christ to love and serve others. THAT is the purpose of freedom.

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Applying Biblical Teachings July 2016

"Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God" (Col. 3:1).

By God's grace, we have been given the benefit of Christ's resurrection. Through Word and Sacrament, we have been justified sanctified and shall in this body be glorified. Therefore, we seek those things which are not of this world, but those things which are of heaven, where Jesus the Christ is seated at the right hand of God the Father.

We do not seek the things of this world, for just as we "have been raised with Christ," we have died also. The Apostle Paul also writes in his letter to the Colossians, "For you died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God" (Col. 3:3). What does a dead person know of or care about his money, investments and possessions? The answer is, "Nothing." How can a dead person use his money, investments and possessions? The answer is, "He cannot." As Solomon explained in Ecclesiastes 2:21, "For a man may do his work with wisdom, knowledge and skill, and then he must leave all he owns to someone who has not worked for it. This too is meaningless and a great misfortune."

But the apostle's writing goes further. A dead person cannot fulfill the requirements of the ceremonial law of any form of religion that requires the use of money, possessions, talents, etc. How many times can a dead person be required to attend church? How many Bible verses can a dead person be required to memorize? How much service may a dead person be required to do? How many tithes can a dead person give?

The answer to all of these questions is the same: None! When one sets requirements for any reason by applying human wisdom and understanding, then that person is perverting the Gospel message. That person has failed in understanding the Gospel, for he or she is operating, serving and giving in the realm of the dead. This is the warning the Apostle Paul was giving in his letter to the Colossians.

We are children of the first resurrection. By water and the Word, we have been raised with Christ to a new life, having our hearts set on things above. Though physically we may look the same, we are not. We have been raised to a spiritual life, which in this world is invisible, for it is hidden in Christ. This life already has power and victory over sin, physical death and the power of the devil. This life, with its heart set on things above, operates with the intangible things it has in Christ.

What does this mean? We are a Gospel-led people. We have been given the victory of Christ. We have put on Christ. We are imitators of Christ. In Christ, we are a competent people who need not be told by others what our decisions must be. We do God's will, for in this victory of the resurrection, we have the freedom to do what God desires.

Thus, when it comes to worship, we say and do as David wrote, "I love the house where you live, O Lord, the place where your glory dwells" (Psalm 26:8). When it comes to the study of God's Word, we say and do as Luther wrote in that we "hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it." When it comes to serving God and those around us, we say and do as the Apostle Paul wrote in his letter to the Hebrews and "do not forget to do good and to share with others" (Heb. 13:16). And when it comes to giving, we respond as the Apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income" (1 Cor. 16:2).
