A Really New Year!

Last year, in my column in the January 2019 newsletter entitled, "A *New* Year?," I wondered why we got all excited about a so-called "new" year. What is "new" about a New Year? Having lived through this past year, was there anything really new at all? Or was it the same old thing? Looking ahead to 2020, do we really think that the next 365 days will be much different than the past 365 days? Will the New Year really be new or will it be more of the same old stuff?

Obviously, many things will remain the same and not change. Sin will still be in this world in 2020. As a result, there will still be natural disasters, violence, and evil just like before. There will still be sins committed by us and there will still be sins committed against us. Since there will be sin and the wages of sin is death, there will be death in 2020. There are likely friends, family, and acquaintances whom you know and love who will die in 2020 and will not be with you next year at this time. You may die.

However, not everything will remain the same. The year 2020 will be a really new year in the lives of some people. For example, although death is something that is old and will not change, experiencing death in your life in particular would be really new for you. The coming year will be a really new year for myself and my family. If the Lord wills, by this time next year, I will no longer be your pastor and my family and myself will no longer live here in Montana. You also may change jobs, change houses, or change places of residence. 2020 may be a really new year for you in other ways.

Our reluctance to embrace new things and to fear change is illustrated by the following joke. Question: How many Lutherans does it take to change a lightbulb? Answer: Change? What change? Many people (not just Lutherans) do not like change. Something new is unfamiliar to us and that feels uncomfortable. New things may not be as good as the old things. We just can't be sure.

The Word of God tells us of something very important which is new and which is good. The prophet Jeremiah writes in the book of Lamentations these words, "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." (Lamentations 3:22-23) The first part of this passage indicates something old and which never changes, namely, God's love and mercy toward us. Objectively speaking, God's love for you will never stop. God's mercy to you will never come to an end. That is good.

How, then, can we say that God's attitude (love) and kindly action toward us (mercy) is new? It is not new in terms of how God gives us these things, but it is new in the way that we receive these things. Every day, His mercy is extended to us, fresh and new. We experience his care for us, fresh and new every day. We receive forgiveness for all of our sins from Him, fresh and new every day. We are renewed in our hope of eternal life from Him, fresh and new every day. We don't receive yesterday's care, stale love, or used forgiveness. Every day, we receive God's new mercies.

We neither have to become bored with that which remains the same nor fear that which is new. God's unchanging love and His continual forgiveness are good things. New circumstances in our lives do not threaten us or make us afraid. We rely upon God's consistent love and mercy and know they will never change. We rejoice that we receive His love and mercy new every morning.

We are also new people for these new circumstances. By living in our Baptisms with repentance and faith, we are new people every single day of the year. We begin with a fresh slate every day. Each of us is a new person in righteousness and purity every day. Each day is a new experience of God's love and mercy. In that way, 2020 will be a really new year and it will be a really good year, rooted in God's love and reliant upon His mercy. And so, we say, "Happy New Year" and really mean it because we know it is really true.
